Leaders sound off on traffic routes

The creation of a Mid-Valley Highway as well as the upgrade of a few intersections were the main topics of discussion during Tuesday's transportation planning open house and subsequent Council of Governments (COG) meeting.

Tooele City Council members Mike Johnson and Steve Pruden indicated that another exit of Interstate 80 would be ideal for Tooele. They would prefer to extend Tooele's 1200 West all the way out to I-80 but said their second choice would be to have Sheep Lane as the Mid-Valley Highway.

County officials said they too would like to see the Mid-Valley Highway created and that either Sheep Lane or 1200 West could be viable options.

However, Grantsville Mayor Bryon Anderson said a Mid-Valley Highway would not "really benefit" Grantsville as the town already has two I-80 exits. Instead he noted that one of the city's top priorities is to upgrade the intersection of Durfee Street and state Route 112 to a 90 degree angle as well as add turn lanes.

Some leaders from Lake Point indicated that they would like to see Droubay Road paved all the way to their town. At present the road is especially rough and bumpy between Erda and Lake Point as it is just dirt.

Staff members of the Wasatch Front Regional Council (WFRC) as well

County tallies up flood destruction

\$800,000 in damages estimated

Government officials estimate it will cost between \$700,000 and \$800,000 in Tooele County to replace public roads and other public structures demolished by recent flooding.

Part of the price tag includes the cost of building new pipelines to help prevent future problems. The county will also seek funds to build facilities in Stockton to protect culinary water supplies and money to fix a damaged sewer plant in Tooele.

County employees are busy working in conjunction with city, state and federal officials to assess all the damage in the county.

Wade Matthews, public information officer for Tooele County Emergency Management, said he toured the county last week

with officials from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and has been in contact with them this week. He said FEMA officials from the regional office in Denver plan to stay in Utah until Friday. Twelve counties in the state are seeking help from the federal government.

On Tuesday, Tooele County Commission signed a "Local Emergency Declaration," and sent the document to the state. The declaration and visits from state and federal officials are the first steps in seeking relief from FEMA.

Along with a major tour of Tooele City facilities, officials made visits to Stockton, Ophir, Erda and the Tooele Army Depot.

Fires raise warning of hazardous season

Three separate blazes ignited Tooele County's sizzling summer fire season yesterday along both Interstate 80 and state Route 138.

According to Roice Arnold, Tooele County Fire Warden, two different fires began at about 8 a.m. along I-80. The first fire burned about 350 acres near mile marker 64 and the second fire at mile marker 53 scorched about nine-and-a-half acres.

At about 2 p.m. a third fire started near the edge of SR-138 near a power substation on the east side of the road, about a mile from I-80. After crews from the state, Bureau of Land Management, North Tooele County and Grantsville Fire Departments fought the fire for four hours — a total of six acres had been burnt.

While the cause of the fires is

still under investigation, Arnold said it is believed that each was human caused.

He said had these fires happened a month down the road, they would have "definitely been a lot worse." This is because of the huge amount of fuel that is currently growing thanks to the extremely wet spring. In the three or four years he has been in his position, he said this year's growth is the "tallest and thickest" he has seen.

Once the grasses and weeds dry out, Arnold said there will be a high fire risk in the county. He urged caution with smoking, fireworks, any type of ignition switches and campfires.

With the upcoming Fourth of July and Pioneer Day celebrations, the state is also urging safety when it comes to fireworks.

Tooele Arts Festival gears up to celebrate 20 great years

Artists and food vendors are busily setting up booths in preparation for the 20th annual Tooele Arts Festival to be held Friday through Sunday at the Tooele City Park, said Bucky Whitehouse, festival media advisor.

Of particular interest this year will be the booth featuring a pictorial retrospective of the festival's 20-year history, Whitehouse said. The booth, located across from the registration booth, will also feature works donated by artists to be sold during the event. Proceeds from the auction will be used to support further growth and development of the festival.

Guests can vie for the auction pieces in two ways, Whitehouse said. The larger works will be available in a silent auction format. Winners of specific auction pieces will be announced each evening right before the headliner musical performances scheduled at 8 p.m. Smaller artworks will

be awarded through a raffle auction. Each ticket purchased gives an opportunity to take home a piece of the festival.

Although there are no doors, the festival will begin each morning at 10 a.m. Most booths will be closed by 8 p.m., Whitehouse said, although individual vendors may close earlier or later at their own discretion.

Opening ceremonies will be held Friday at 6 p.m. followed by a 7 p.m. performance by the popular satirical group "Saliva Sisters." Headliner "Hard Days Night," will begin their brand or Beatles music at 8 p.m.

"They are very highly touted, and we're fortunate to have them at our event," Whitehouse said of the look-alike band.

Saturday's music will feature the Salt Lake Scotts, a bagpipe band, at 2 p.m. The climax of their performance is the moment when they encircle the park, bringing the music to festival guests in a live version of surround sound.

- Buy fireworks in Utah from licensed fireworks stands or retail outlets.
- Select only safe fireworks that are legal for use in Utah.

- Never experiment with fireworks.
- Ignite outdoors away from buildings, dry grasses, trees or bushes.
- Never re-ignite malfunctioning fireworks.
- Allow enough room for proper functioning.



- Light one at a time.
- Keep a safe distance away.
- Never give fireworks to small children.
- Store in a cool, dry and safe place out of reach of children.
- Keep a bucket or a garden

- hose handy.
 - Dispose of properly.

1-145th Field Artillery to conduct equipment christening ceremony

First Battalion, 145th Field Artillery, Utah National Guard, will conduct a christening ceremony for their new Paladin weapons systems in Dugway, Utah, on Friday, June 24, 2005, at 8 a.m.

At the ceremony, Soldiers will follow a time-honored tradition by naming their new artillery pieces-18 M109A6 Paladin self-propelled howitzers-and recognizing the service of their old guns, 18 M198 howitzers.

After the christening units will calibrate (fire) the howitzers with live ammunition to determine individual howitzer muzzle velocities.

The Paladin is the most advanced artillery weapons platform in the Army's inventory. It is the first cannon capable of processing its own firing data using an onboard computer system.

Paladins can maneuver about the battlefield as part of a two-gun section, three-gun platoon and six-gun battery or combine with other firing batteries and fire as part of an 18-gun battalion.

The mission of the 1-145th is to provide field artillery support to a division or corps. The unit was notified in 2004 that the Army would convert from using M198s to Paladins.

Lt. Col. Dallen Attack, commander of the 1-145th, is excited about the capability of the new artillery pieces.

"Converting to the Paladin will make us more relevant to the future missions of the Army," he said. "This new howitzer greatly enhances our responsiveness to front-line soldiers and increases the survivability of our own unit members."

Earlier this month soldiers of the 1-145th completed Advanced Field Artillery Tactical Data System training at Camp Guernsey, Wyo., and have rede-

ployed to Dugway to participate in the Paladin new equipment training.

The battalion has its headquarters at Camp Williams, Utah, and has units based in Ogden, Spanish Fork, Manti and

Fillmore. The unit maintains an energetic training association with the 115th Field Artillery Brigade in Wyoming and is affiliated with I Corps Artillery, also located at Camp Williams.

as the Utah Department of Transportation attended both the open house and COG gatherings. Sam Klemm, WFRM Community Affairs Representative said he was pleased with the turnout and comments that were made. He said the county was “very forthright in telling us about their concerns.”

He noted that invitations were sent to county officials as well as to the individual city governments within the Tooele Valley. Members of the general public were also asked to

attend the open house where the future transportation plans of the county were discussed.

Klemm said he would have liked to have seen leaders from Stansbury Park at the meeting but was pleased to have seen representatives from the other communities.

Klemm said the next step is to “crank out” some “what-if alternatives.” For example what if we build this road first instead of that one or what if we widen this road before building that one.

After about four alternatives are created by the WFRM staff they will be brought back before the COG as well as to a separate public meeting.

“I think we will hold one in Grantsville and in Stansbury to reach a wider audience,” said Klemm.

Once the four “what-ifs” are discussed a draft proposal will be created and again be brought before the public and the council for approval.

The plan that is agreed upon is what will be submitted to the Utah Department of Transportation as a “strong suggestion” of what the local residents and leaders want to happen in the long run.

Rockwell dismissed from planning commission and other county news

From the implementation of new rules to swapping land, Tooele County leaders have been busy during the month of June.

Here are just a few of the things they have been up to.

Rockwell removed from planning commission

Due to a new state law, (Utah code 17-27-A-701) county commissioners can no longer sit on area planning and zoning commissions. Thus Tooele County Commission Chair Dennis Rockwell was taken off the Tooele County Planning and Zoning Commission on Tuesday, a board he has served on as a member for the past six-and-a-half years.

The statute, which was adopted by the Utah Legislature, earlier this year notes, “An appeal authority ... may not entertain an appeal of a matter in which the appeal authority, or any participating member, had first acted as the land use authority.”

Because the county commission acts as the appeal authority to the planning commission, none of the county commissioners will be allowed a seat on the planning board in the future.

County attorney Doug Ahlstrom said while such appeals only happen three or four times a year, the point is that they do happen and that the county doesn't want to run into problems in the future. County Planner Nicole Cline said the law change was basically cre-

ated to make sure there were no conflicts of interest or a lack of due process. She also made it clear that Rockwell was being removed from the board because of the new law and not because of any wrong doing.

“He has done a great job,” she noted.

Rockwell said he will miss working with the people on the board as well as being “in the loop” at that level of government. He said while he won't be able to sit on the board, he would likely still attend the meetings to gather information.

Tooele's Tim Booth, who has sat on the Board of Adjustments, will fill Rockwell's shoes. Rockwell said Booth “is civic minded” and should do well in that position.

Trading spaces

When Leucadia Financial obtained land in Stansbury Park for the purpose of development, part of the property came with an extra five-acre piece of land that wasn't connected to the rest of Stansbury Park. The unattached land happened to be a few miles to the west — right in the pathway of the under construction Miller Motorsports Park at the Deseret Peak Complex.

Knowing that the raceway developers would need the small section of land to build the course as desired, the county offered to trade a portion of its land on Bates Canyon Road to Leucadia. However, the land the county offered once served as a landfill and still had debris on it.

Leucadia said it would make the trade on the condition that the county would clean up the landfill so the company could in turn sell the property to the JD Palmer Company.

On Tuesday the deal was sealed during the weekly county commission meeting and it was stated that the waste from the old landfill would be taken by the county to the landfill at Bauer.

The motorsports park will be built as planned.

Bed and Breakfast additions

In response to a request made by Erda's Gerry Larrivee, the county made an amendment to Chapter 15 of the Uniform Zoning Ordinance, adding bed and breakfast facilities to the use matrix.

Thus Larrivee's business (Tipsy Pig Overnight located at 1221 West Erda Way) will now be able to have overnight night guests stay on his property instead of just their horses. Larrivee plans to change the name of his business to Tipsy Pig Overnight B&B Livery, though he must first obtain a conditional use permit from the county.

Emergency Declaration

Ready for an active vacation?

Q: My family and I have planned a vacation this summer that includes hiking and cycling for a week. Although I exercise regularly at the gym, I am not sure if I'm in good enough shape for these specific activities. The trip is in four weeks. What exercises can I do to prepare myself for our trip?

A: Hiking and cycling are fun activities that can be shared by families. Preparing your body to withstand the demands of hiking and cycling can make your trip even more enjoyable. You can use equipment at your gym or at home to help strengthen your muscles, bones and joints to ensure a safe and enjoyable vacation.

Begin adding cardiovascular exercises to your workout routine that require you to adapt to a variety of stresses. For example, begin using the incline on the treadmill to help your heart, legs and other

muscles simulate walking uphill.

Interval training is another activity that can help you to prepare. Use different intensities during your cardiovascular routine to help teach your heart to recover effectively from short bouts of high-intensity exercise.

Cross-training can also get your heart and other muscles ready for action. Instead of doing just one type of cardiovascular exercise to increase your heart rate, use several. For example, you could begin on the treadmill for 10 minutes, then move to the bike for 10 more, then on to the elliptical machine, followed by an arm bike. This will keep your heart rate elevated for an allotted time while using different methods of training. Ask a fitness professional at your gym for an interval and cross-training program that is right for you.

Strength training will be important to keep your muscles and joints strong throughout your trip. Perform total-body exercise routines that require you to control your body weight. Chest, back,

shoulders, glutes, legs, calf and arm exercises should also be a part of your training. Push-ups, squats, lunges and pull-ups are also great exercises to add to your current routine.

It is extremely important to strengthen the muscles of your abdomen, lower back and hips. The weaker these muscles are, the more difficult your hiking and cycling activities will be. And don't forget flexibility and balance exercises.

Finally, walk and cycle outdoors before your trip get your body accustomed to performing these activities in the appropriate environment.

Some Utah trees showing plight of coryneum blight

Rain has returned to Utah and lawns and trees are lush. Just when gardeners are feeling comfortable, diseases are starting to rear their ugly heads.

“A couple of diseases are out in full force,” said Jerry Goodspeed, Utah State University Extension horticulturist. “Currently, the most dominate is Coryneum blight, also known as shot-hole disease. The name shot-hole refers to the appearance of holes in the leaves that look like they were made by someone taking a shotgun to the infected tree.”

Stone fruit trees such as peaches, nectarines, plums and cherries tend to be susceptible to Coryneum blight, said Goodspeed. They are aptly named stone fruits for the very hard, normally large pit or stone in the center of each fruit.

“Coryneum blight is a fungus that overwinters on the tree in blighted buds or twigs,” he said. “The fungus is then spread by rain from the infections to other parts of the tree. Over the past couple of years, this has not been a major problem because of the dry springs we have had in Utah. This year, however, has been different.”

The most common symptoms are dropping leaves and branches and twigs dying back, said Goodspeed. Close examination of twigs and branches shows purple or brown cankers and sunken areas or gumming where the disease has taken hold. These cankers can eventually girdle the

twig or branch, killing it above the infection.

“Another symptom is shot-holes in the leaves,” said Goodspeed. “Red spots first appear, then the center drops out, leaving small holes throughout the leaves. This disease can also form small red bumps on the fruit as it matures. These are normally only blemishes and do not affect the flavor of the fruit. This is purely an aesthetic problem, and the fruit can still be used ... if there is any left.”

Coryneum blight is hard to control, he said. The infection on any branch or twig can be a source of spores for the next year or two. For this reason, it is important to remove and destroy any severely infected branches. An acute infestation may mean that a large portion of the tree will have to be removed.

Several fungicides can be applied for control of this disease. Since it spreads in the wet spring, it is best to apply the fungicide at shuck-split, or after the flowers have fallen from the tree. A second spraying is suggested in the fall when the leaves have dropped. Registered fungicides recommended for homeowners include chlorothalonil (Daconil), Ziram, Captan and basic copper sulfate. As with all pesticides, be sure to read and follow label directions carefully. It is important to also keep the area clean and free of all diseased limbs and twigs, Goodspeed concluded.

History camp at Camp Floyd

“Exploring Life with Johnston’s Army” is the theme for Camp Floyd State Parks 2005 History Camp. Scheduled Aug. 4–6, 2005, the event is designed for children between eight years of age through eleven years of age. The three day camp is a fun-filled educational experience about how soldiers lived during the Utah and Civil Wars — at home, in the camp and on the battlefield — and how the Wars changed people’s lives.

Activities will include marching, drilling and firearm exercises; play games such as chuck-a-luck, graces and horseshoes; construct rifle cartridges, corps badges, thaumatropes and learn to set up a Civil War camp. The highlight of the event will be a battle re-enactment with members of the Utah Civil War Association, using the skills campers have learned during the previous days.

The camp will be conducted from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. each day. Campers will be returning home each night with furlough papers. The cost is \$65 for the three-day session and will be limited to 24. Registration deadline is June 24, 2005. For more information, contact the park at 801-768-8932.

Save energy during the sizzling summer months

Quick and easy everyday advice can make all the difference

Energy consumption is on the rise, and the depletion of fossil fuels has become a growing problem in the United States. According to the United States Department of Energy, the U.S. uses almost a million dollars of electricity a minute, which is equivalent to approximately \$525.6 billion each year. Monitor indoor water usage — Take showers instead of baths and turn off the faucet when brushing your teeth and doing the dishes. If the dishwasher must be used, run

full loads and adjust water-level settings to increase efficiency.

Control computer settings — Computer usage in many homes increases during the summer, mainly because children are home from school. If the computer won’t be in use for more than five minutes, set it to hibernate or sleep mode to save energy.

Avoid cooking in the oven — If possible, consider cooking and reheating meals in the microwave or on an outside grill rather than in the oven. If the oven must be used, pre-heat it only when necessary and while in use, avoid opening the oven door unless absolutely necessary.

Minimize appliance usage — Large indoor appliances such as dishwashers, washing machines, dryers and water heaters generate lots of heat. To maintain cooler temperatures indoors, use appliances sparingly and late in the evening.

Wash full loads of laundry — Use cold water for both the wash and rinse cycles. Laundry can be air-dried and put into the dryer for the last five minutes to ensure softness and save energy. Over-

drying clothes wastes energy and can accelerate wear and tear on your clothes.

Enjoy the sunshine — Avoid using electric lights during the day; open a curtain or two to brighten a room and enjoy the natural light! Sunshine can also be an energy saver during pre-summer months when passive solar heat can warm a room effectively, rather than using electric or gas heat.

Curb aggressive driving habits — Rapid acceleration, extreme braking and speeding are not only unsafe practices, they can increase gas mileage greatly. The first years of the festival, it was held during the first week of June. But not only did it rain, it was also cold. It even snowed on one festival.

“Snow cones didn’t sell very well that year,” Cummings said.

In an attempt to avoid rainwater, the festival was moved to the end of June. While this hasn’t put an end to cloudbursts, at least the weather is warmer, she said.

But the weather is just one of

the challenges faced with good humor over the festival’s 20-year history.

A booth sponsored by Dave’s Drug will display framed posters, programs and photographs of the last two decades. No programs were printed for the first three years because the festival could not afford them, she said.

The festival has grown in size and fame since the first event featuring some half-dozen vendors, but one thing has remained constant, a high quality of arts on display.

The Utah Symphony per-

formed at the first festival held in the small park on the corner of Tooele’s Vine and Main Street. Other performers seen over the years include Diamond Rio and an up-and-coming country western band Montana. While good things were expected from Montana, band members were killed in an airplane crash one or two years after their Tooele performance and they were never able to achieve their full potential.

In addition to a 20-year retrospective, the Dave’s Drug booth will also feature works donated by artists to be sold in a silent auction. Proceeds of the auction will go toward keeping the festival afloat, Cummings said.

Part of the money raised by the auction will also be used to pay for the entertainment, she said. This year the big name performers, Saliva Sisters and Hard Day’s Night, will be on stage Friday evening. She said they decided to have the popular entertainers perform on the first night of the festival to bring visitors out early. Once people see what the festival has to offer, they are likely to return on Saturday and Sunday, she said.

Another constant through the 20 years of the festival are the volunteers. While the original four organizers “has turned into 40,” committee members, most of them have been involved in the event for 10 to 15 years, she said.

Cummings herself was in on the ground floor of the festival, and although she claims no artistic talent, she says she has used her talent by volunteering to keep the festival on track every year.

This year, as she has for 19 years, Cummings said “we are keeping our fingers crossed and hope we don’t have any problem with the weather.”

But whatever the weather, the popular festival is sure to persevere.

Saturday’s music will feature the Salt lake Scotts, a bagpipe band, at 2 p.m. The climax of their performance is the moment when they encircle the park, bringing the music to festival guests in a live version of surround sound.

A gospel group will perform Sunday at noon followed by the

popular Bavarians featuring traditional folk music. Local performers will also take to the stage throughout the festival. A complete schedule of music and dance events will be available at the registration booth, Whitehouse said.

Food booths are almost as important as art during the three-day celebration, Whitehouse said. And with 20 booths serving everything from tacos to Greek gyros, there are plenty of options to please every pallet.

The Spotted Dog Creamery will bring old-fashioned favorites like ice cream and root beef floats, while Volker’s Bakery from Kamas Utah will serve up breads with dipping sauce and Volker’s Pizza will be baking made-to-order pizzas in their wood burning oven.

St. Marguerite’s Church will be serving the popular bratwurst and sauerkraut next to the beer garden. The two booths have become

a well-liked tradition at the fair.

The children’s art yard, another institution at the festival, gives the younger set a chance to participate with hands-on art entertainment. Projects include flower-themed crafts on Friday, toys and sports on Saturday, and all things bug related on Sunday. While parents are invited to leave their children at the art yard, Whitehouse said they should check up on them periodically to make sure they are comfortable and happy.

While parking has been a problem in past years, Whitehouse suggested the best place to leave cars is the Tooele High School parking lot located across the street from the festival.

The Tooele Arts Festival is supported in part by a grant from the Utah Arts Council. Tooele County also offers support both with cash and services.

City leaders in Grantsville report no municipal damage from the spring runoff. Grantsville Mayor Byron Anderson said Grantsville Irrigation workers and city workers were well-prepared to handle the runoff.

“We dug trenches north and east of the city to divert high runoff water,” the mayor said. He also said the Grantsville Irrigation Company worked extremely hard to protect city property.

“It was not so much luck, as it was good planning,” Anderson said.

The official declaration states that the county received severe damage brought on by heavy spring runoff during the months of April, May and June; and the extraordinary conditions were compounded by a severe thunderstorm of unusual magnitude, including lightning, hail and heavy rain on May 30.

The declaration spells out current conditions resulting from the runoff and the one-day torrential downpour. Those items include a damaged water filtration system, damaged and overburdened water treatment facility resulting in raw sewage back-flowing into homes; flood-

ing, damaged asphalt roads; washed out dirt roads, water damaged homes, homes without electricity, water damaged schools, water damaged county emergency operations center, water damaged county courthouse, damaged fire truck and depleted sandbag supplies.

After all the information is submitted, FEMA and state officials will review it and will most likely seek more specific information from the county, according to Matthews.

“We will be anxious to learn which projects will qualify for assistance. This could mean a lot of help for the county,” Matthews said.

County officials said it is important for homeowners to keep records of items damaged by the flooding and receipts or records of expenses. Sometimes there are private and government programs designed to help those in need, but all these programs require adequate documentation.

FEMA public information officer Randy Welch said some federal programs are available for private homeowners.

“These are usually grants or low-interest loans from the SBA (Small Business Administration),” Welch said.

Remember that classic *Herbie* scene where the intrepid little bug comes putting and teetering around the corner ridge of a tall building in a mad, point-less chase? I have fond memories of it.

A snippet of that scene, incorporated nostalgically into the opening credits of *Herbie: Fully Loaded* brought forth a previously stagnant recollection of children in a school gym on the last day of school, screaming with glee at Herbie's antics.

Fully Loaded isn't far off from the original. Sure, it's

cheeky, slapstick, juvenile stuff. But it was fun then, and it's fun now to see a car slap people around and beat them into submission.

Teen Queen Lindsay Lohan (who also resurrected *The Parent Trap* and *Freaky Friday* for Disney) headlines as Maggie Peyton, a recent college grad who winds up with a demoralized old VW Bug from a scrap yard for her graduation gift.

In her youth Maggie loved to race, but her protective father, Ray Peyton (played by Michael Keaton) won't have any of it. Herbie has his own agenda, and wants Maggie to race. After provoking vain-glorious Nascar champ Trip Murphy (Matt Dillon, in an entertaining "bad guy" turn) by vandalizing his car, Herbie beats him in an impromptu street race. And now, Herbie and Matt Dillon are at war.

Maggie's friend, a mechanic played by the adorable Justin

Long, restores Herbie for her and encourages her to accept Murphy's challenges; against the wishes of her father. She, the granddaughter of a legendary driver, instinctively feels that she might be the "next great Peyton."

Her father is too afraid of allowing her this opportunity, and instead pins his hops on Maggie's brother (Breckin Meyer), who has no talent. It's up to Maggie and Herbie alone to claim their destinies.

When Herbie takes his unavoidable detour to Nascar, we find ourselves in product placement heaven. Speeding Viagra billboards and Cheetos racing uniforms are the hilarious pinnacle. Nascar should be in more movies, what with product placement becoming a staple in film. Volkswagen completes their entitled product placement by having the best friend of Maggie drive a Touareg and providing Herbie a hot romance with a late

model yellow Beetle.

The movie ends with the compulsory race scene, but ironically, that's when it starts to chug and slow down. Sometimes, even 90 minute movies should be cut just a little bit shorter.

Props still go to director Angela Robinson for faithfully keeping Herbie's spirit alive, even if Herbie was never anything more than a childhood diversion. For some reason, a car with a 'tude is still funny.

Even better: a car with a 'tude acting up with a retro-dippy soundtrack in the background. Lionel Ritchie's dewy "Hello" accompanies an intimate moment between Herbie and his yellow dream car. I love it.

Hatch calls for no private nuclear waste storage

Sen. Orrin G. Hatch (R-Utah) recently secured the assurance of the Senate's top energy policymaker that the Senate will pursue a strong policy of storing nuclear waste at federal facilities, not private, off-site facilities such as the proposed nuclear waste repository at the Skull Valley Goshute Indian Reservation in Utah.

"President Bush has called for a robust nuclear power strategy, but we cannot have one until we know what to do with all the spent nuclear fuel," Hatch said. "It's becoming quickly apparent to me and to the people of Utah that we do not have a coherent national nuclear waste policy. A few nuclear power companies

should not hijack our nation's nuclear waste strategy by building an off-site, above-ground storage site in Skull Valley."

"Is our nuclear waste policy going to be established by the federal government, or should that policy-making rest with a couple of private companies driven by profit?" Hatch asked during a speech on the Senate floor. "Do we want the federal government to take possession of our high level nuclear waste, or is our national waste policy to allow private companies to control the transport, storage and security of this waste?"

During today's debate on the Senate energy bill, Hatch asked Senate Energy Committee

Chairman Pete Dominici (R-Colo.) if storing spent nuclear fuel at Skull Valley is a component of the nation's nuclear waste policy.

"I would say that our national policy for handling high-level nuclear waste is to store it at the proposed DOE site at Yucca Mountain," Dominici responded. "In my view, our focus should remain on a solution that puts this waste directly in the hands of the federal government."

After receiving this assurance from Chairman Dominici, Hatch agreed to postpone consideration of an amendment he sponsored with Sen. Bob Bennett (R-Utah) that would ban the transportation of high level nuclear

waste to private away-from-reactor waste sites. The legislation would also call for a study to the feasibility of storing spent fuel either at Department of Energy facilities or of the Department taking possession of the spent fuel on-site at nuclear reactors. Finally, the amendment would also require a study of reprocessing spent nuclear fuel for future use.

Hatch has been working closely with members of Utah's Congressional delegation, Utah Governor Jon Hunstman, Jr., and key players in the Bush Administration to prevent nuclear waste from being stored at the Skull Valley site.

However, when the Buff senior managed to take second place in the time trials and still didn't kick it into an extra gear, Hughes knew his ultimate dream of winning a state title could be accomplished with some focus and determination.

"In the (300) trials I took second and I knew that it was too easy," he said. "Then I knew I had a chance to take the title. I was still pretty scraped up. But I just had to mentally prepare myself for the 300. My mind was set to take first. I wanted revenge and to beat the Dixie kid. I knew when I passed the finish line I knew I could beat him. I didn't really try hard in the trials. Once I got to the finals, I knew I could beat him if I gave my all. It was hard to believe. I knew I was ready for the challenge. And now I finally got it. It was my number one goal in life. It's good to finish off a (prep) career like that. I've accomplished the best thing you can accomplish in high school. I've always dreamed about winning a state championship and now my hard work has paid off and I did it."

Then, Hughes joined forces with Buff teammates Shane Ahlstrom, Josh Boucher and Kyler Brown to garner a silver medal in the state 1600 meter relay at 3:30.09. Only Dixie finished ahead of the Tooele team with a state title run of 3:25.85. Quite a remarkable and contrasting two days of state com-

petition for the Tooele senior.

Tooele Coach Kendra Reed said she was ecstatic for her hard working senior.

"I was so proud of Tyson," she stated. "He stepped up, after eating the turf (in the 110), and winning the state 300 hurdles. And then to turn around in the 4-by-4 relay and run a sub 50. He was scraped bad and still came through for the team. It was an awesome performance."

As for the team, Coach Reed was proud of them all.

"They were so cool and did so awesome," she noted about the entire Buff squad. "We took second in the 1600 meter relay with their best time of the year. Lauren (Lescanec) really ran an awesome time in the 4-by-400 and placed fourth in the high jump. She is going to get better and better. She and Holly Tyler don't realize how good they can be if they just stay with us for four years. When Liz (Miller) tripped on a hurdle, it spooked both her and Holly. And for them to come back and step it up, being so young and the size of the meet. Lauren kept her head about her throughout the meet, going from 14th to 5th. Abree (Mattinson) did a good job of keeping the team together regardless of how young we are. It was really neat to see Mark (Dunn) respond after getting boxed in the 1600 to shoot out in the 3200 and PR in the state event and did the same in the 800. Our 4-by-400 really showed their heart and everyone PR'd. We ran smart, we ran great.

Meredith (Nigh) did really well in the long jump. She improved her biggest jump of the year and to do that at state was fantastic. It was just a fantastic weekend for our Tooele teams."

The state meet capped the prep track & field careers of seniors Shane Ahlstrom, Mark Dunn, Josh Boucher, Tyson Hughes, Bryan Murray, Brian Boehmer, Abree Mattinson, Risa Garcia, Rachele Carr and Missy Thompson.

Tooele High's Tyson Hughes, Grantsville's Shalane Titmus proved they are the best athletes in their specific event during the 2005 season and each captured coveted state titles under the pressure of state competition.

Hughes powered his way to the 300 hurdles in the Class 3A ranks while Cowgirl senior Titmus vaulted to the high jump state crown after two consecutive seasons of second place finishes.

Hughes led the Tooele boys team to a 14th place overall state team finish with his title in the 300 hurdles. The Buff senior joined forces with Mark Dunn, Shane Ahlstrom, Kyler Brown, Josh Boucher, Trifon Gochis, Rick Sanders, Nick Terry, Shay Asay and Race Warburton all contributed to the team's state success.

Judge Memorial ruled the field with 111 points and Bear River was a distant second place at 68.5. Clausing, Griffin and Bissegger had one hit each for the Buffs in the game.





Stansbury trustees OK proposal to patrol lake for illegal activity

Summer brings out the fishermen on Stansbury Lake, but it also brought up questions about illegal lake usage during the Stansbury Service Agency meeting Wednesday night.

A proposal from Kenyon Easton, board member, to hire someone in a part-time capacity to patrol the lake for trespassers and unregistered motorized boats was met with unanimous approval.

The popularity of the privately owned lake was apparent as anglers cast lines from the shore just outside the clubhouse during the meeting. Stansbury residents are allowed to fish the lake without a license. Non-residents are required to be accompanied by a resident if they fish the lake, said Gary Ziser, board chairman.

However, motorized boats on the lake do require licenses. The lake patrol officer will be hired in a temporary capacity to remind people of the rules, Easton said. Cathy Achziger suggested the patrolman be given cards printed with information about rules and boat registration information. The cards could be handed out to people found violating Park rules, she said.

Easton said he wanted to patrol the lake, not to punish violators, but to protect Stansbury residents who pay impact fees for use of the waterway.

In other action the board agreed to sign off on the greenbelt plans on Stansbury Place, a development on Village Blvd., proposed by Richard Moffat, representing the developer. The plat will go on to be reviewed by Tooele County Planning Commission for preliminary approval. Further fine

The Stansbury Service Agency has OK'd a proposal to hire a part-time employee to enforce lake regulations.

tuning of the proposal will continue until the plan receives final approval, Moffat said.

The design includes a seven-to 10-foot-wide parking strip to accommodate meandering sidewalk and trees. A ditch, required by Tooele County, was also discussed at length. In the proposal the ditch is lined with a weed patch fabric and filled with cobblestones. Moffat said this system would allow water to perk back into the ground, reducing the amount of runoff collected in a catchments basin.

Yuka Jenkins of Utah Power and Light was granted permission for the company to replace existing lines around the clubhouse with bigger cable. In order to avoid damage to landscape areas, Jenkins said UP&L workers would tunnel under the parking lot.

"The existing facilities are old and getting rusty," she said. UP&L plans to make loops so if one of the lines goes down "we have another way to feed you."

In discussion items, Tooele County Commissioner Matt Lawrence approached the board for citizen input on economic development of the Stansbury Park area. "What do people here want?" he asked.

While the Stansbury Service Agency has no jurisdiction over economic development, Ziser

said, "I can go on record that residents in an overwhelming majority favor commercial development."

He said 30 acres of commercial zoned land is available, and land owners are looking for an anchor grocery story to bring retail business to Stansbury Park. However, they have been struggling to find businesses willing to locate in the area.

"I think there would be a lot of interest," said Achziger. "A lot of people, the younger people especially, go to Salt Lake City (to shop)." She added, "I didn't know you (the county) were interested in helping. If you are halleluiah."

David Lawrence, board member, said part of the challenge is Stansbury Park "doesn't exist as a community." Although Stansbury Park is 7,000 to 8,000 people strong, they are unincorporated, and therefore fall into a no-mans land between Tooele City and Tooele County. David Lawrence said a business district "would give us some kind of identity."

He suggested establishing an ombudsman position to field comments from Stansbury residents and work with Tooele County commission.

No decision was made, but board members agreed they were very supportive of the idea of pursuing economic development at the north end of Tooele County.

New Life Fellowship celebrates five years

The New Life Christian Fellowship in Tooele, co-pastored by Dale and Tricia Jumpp, will celebrate its five-year anniversary in Tooele on Sunday, June 26.

The celebration will include a traditional service at 10 a.m. featuring guest speaker Reverend Cameron Mullis (Pastor Dale Jumpp's brother-in-law) who will be flying in from Florida.

After the 10 a.m. service, there will be a dinner at noon and a special afternoon service at 2 p.m. featuring a multimedia presentation on the church's history, music and comments from various members of the church.

New Life Christian Fellowship is located at 411 E. Utah Ave. in the building that housed the Catholic Parish 25-30 years ago. The Jumpps rented it in July of 2000 and purchased it in January of 2002.

The couple originally started the New Life Christian Fellowship Church in Tooele after feeling called to move from Jacksonville, Florida, to minister in the Salt Lake City area.

They didn't even know Tooele existed. And they didn't know why they had come.

"We felt like we were called to the Salt Lake area, so we moved out here, but we didn't know a soul out here," Dale said.

After arriving they sought additional guidance from God and believe God guided them to start what became the first charismatic nondenominational church in Tooele.

There were six founding mem-

bers and 21 people showed up at their first service. Today between 80-120 individuals show up for the weekly 10 a.m. service, and approximately 150 individuals are affiliated with the church.

New Life Christian Fellowship first met in the Best Western, before relocating to their current building.

Over the years, the Jumpps have worked to renovate, while preserving the historical identity of the building. They have redone the outside of the structure, adding white stucco. The doors to the chapel, once a murky green, are now a light grey and windows have been added to them. In addition they have put acrylic on the outside of the 16 identical stain-glassed windows surrounding the chapel, removing the old metal grates that covered the outsides. An airy pavillion has been added around back (church member Tony Bowlin donated his time and materials to build it). In addition, the greenhouse in front is filled with plants and three flood-lights makes it a cheery display for passersby — day or night. Tricia was told Catholic nuns once used to grow tomatoes in the greenhouse all year long.

Dale and Tricia Jumpp met at Lee College in Cleveland, Tenn. Tricia has a bachelor's in sociology from Lee College and a master's in education from the University of Northern Florida. Dale has a degree in computer programming from Massey Business College and a bachelor's in business from Lee College, with minors in psychology and religion. Both completed their doctoral course work at the Jacksonville Theological Seminary.

STARTS VENERABLE BUSINESS OUT ON THE RIGHT HOOF

Joe Wells is not a typical entrepreneur. At the age of 18 he has carved out a thriving business with 260 clients and an apprentice.

Not only is his age remarkable, so is his career choice, Wells is a furrier — also known as a horseshoer, and business is booming.

“I’ve been under a horse since I was 11 or 12,” Wells says. “Ever since I was a little kid I have always liked horses.”

Wells was introduced to horseshoeing by his brother-in-law, Doug Larsen. He spent his summers in Price holding horses while Larsen shod them. “Most people think holding horse is boring, but I liked to watch. I could watch it all day,” he said.

He shod his own horse at the age of 15, and said it took him about four hours to do the job. His time and skills have vastly improved since that first attempt. He says he can now shoe a horse in 30 to 40 minutes.

While Larson introduced Wells to shoeing, the youngster also learned by taking classes and studying about shoeing in books. He also honed his craft by working on his own horses, then shoeing horses for friends. “It went from there,” he said.

Wells was shoeing horses before he was old enough to drive, and he depended upon his parents to get him to his early jobs. “My parents were really supportive,” he says. When he became serious enough to become certified at the age of 16 he already had a year of practical experience under his belt.

Being a furrier is “more an art,” than a science, Wells said. “The basics never change, you can’t reinvent it.” Furriers need to know a little general anatomy, and knowledge about trimming a hoof and shaping the shoe.” But, he adds, “while some things are always the same, every horse has different feet, every horse walks a little differently.”

As a trained furrier he can spot the warning signs of diseases and help correct the gait of horses that are turning in and turning out, he said. Inexperienced horse shoers can actually lame a horse. He told the story of one horse owner borrowing his tools and clipping the hoof too close, causing it to “bleed all over the place,” he said. “It made me sick.”

Wells said he has three goals, to make sure the horses stay sound, to help them perform to the best of their ability and to keep the customer happy.

Judging by his hectic work load, Wells does a good job on the last goal. With the help of apprentice Curtis Vance in an assembly-line system the duo can shoe 17 horses a day

Curtis started working with Wells in much the same way Wells started with his brother-in-law. “He started following me around,” Wells said. “I taught him until finally he became useful.” Curtis is now paid a commission on each horse they shoe together.

In the summer, the duo works from sun-up to sun-down to serve all his clients. “I haven’t been home for a week,” he says. That includes drive time, which is considerable. His clients are from all over — from Wendover to Salt Lake County, Ogden, Spanish Fork and Roosevelt. He buys \$400 to \$500 worth of shoes weekly to keep his truck stocked during the busy season. His regular clientele can count on a visit every eight weeks without setting up appointments.

Wells looks younger than his 18 years because of his slight frame. But “(shoeing is) harder for the big guys,” he says. “Being small, I don’t have to bend over as much.” In

Reduce weeds before they start

Avid gardeners love beautiful gardens — that is stating the obvious. However, the flip side of beautiful gardens is weeds. Some of us do battle with insects and diseases, but in reality, neither is likely to run rampant. Weeds, on the other hand, are universal. It is easy to look at a well-kept garden and assume that the lucky gardener who maintains it does not have as many problems with these unwanted plants as we do.

Of course, unwanted plants grow well in any cultivated, irrigated spot, so all gardens do get weeds. In reality, some gardeners have to deal with fewer weeds than other gardeners do. Generally, they deal with fewer weeds because they follow a few practices that keep them at bay.

There are very good reasons to keep weeds under control beyond the aesthetic value of a weed-free garden. Weeds compete with desirable plants. They reduce yields in vegetable gardens and detract from the health and vigor of landscape plants.

- To gain the upper hand,

think about weeds before you even see them. For example, get rid of perennial weeds before you plant permanent crops like lawn and shrubs. They are much harder to control when they are intermingled with desired plants. Devoting a season to combat such difficult weeds as quack grass, white top, and field bindweed is well worth the wait before planting perennial plants.

- If you can fertilize without using manures you will find fewer unwanted plants among the crops. Irrigation water delivered by ditches is often the source of weed seeds. If you can filter water from ground-top irrigation sources, you will also reduce your weed problems.
- Prepare a seedbed that eliminates weeds.
- I realize it is a little late so say, “Plant early,” but if you can give your transplants a head start over the weeds by planting in the season when they grow quickly, then you have an advantage.
- Weed early. The major outbreak of weeds is in the spring. If you can get that first flush under control, keeping weeds down later in the year is easier.
- Spend time in your garden. Weeds are not born three feet tall. Get them while they are young. A gliding hoe or similar tool will easily stop tiny weeds but you may end up pulling and digging larger weeds. Pull weeds among crops before

their root systems become extensive enough to interfere with neighboring plants

- Use mulch such as plastic, grass clippings or other seed-free organic mulch. Covering and shading the soil will stop many weeds before they start.
- Pre-emergent herbicides can be a real asset. Galleria is a long-lasting one that works especially well on annual grass weeds. Trflan and Dacthal are two more that work well. Keep in mind that these do not kill existing weeds — they act on newly germinating seeds by creating a barrier over the top of the soil. Get all existing weeds out before using these products and avoid disturbing the soil after they are applied. Always read and follow label directions before applying any herbicide to use it effectively and to avoid damaging existing plants.
- Fusilade, the active ingredient in Grass-B Gone, controls grasses among a wide range of ornamental plants. Again, read the instructions and disclaimers so you don’t put it around plants it will damage. It is very helpful to remove grass from flowerbeds.
- Mechanical controls are by far the best for gardens, unless you are dealing with tough perennials like those mentioned above. For these you may want to purchase glyphosate — the active ingredient in such products as Round-up, Killzall,

spite of the long hours, Wells says he never works so hard his muscles ache, although the work is exhausting.

"A lot of people think it requires a lot of strength and hard labor," Wells said of his trade. "But it's more technique. A lot of guys quit because they don't like horses." Wells said he has "seldom, if ever" walked away from a horse because it was too difficult to shoe it. "If you know how to deal with them, you can work around them," he said.

He has never had problems with his back as a result of his occupation, but the work does take a toll on his hands and elbows — which take the brunt of the tool work - and his fingers, which can get whacked with the hammer when he misses a nail.

In spite of the long hours, Wells said he loves his job. "I really like horses, that keeps me going and happy." He adds, "There are so many people to talk

to, I laugh all day."

Wells, who owns his own horse — or horses depending on the day, also uses his contacts to make deals. "I see a lot of horses, I buy and sell horses really easily," he said. His connections with the horse-loving set give him "opportunities to make little deals with the network of people," he said.

In spite of his heavy work load, he says he makes time to ride. In fact, he says, one of the advantages of being his own boss is he can fit play in around his work schedule.

During prime shoeing season, Wells earns \$600-\$1,000 a day. But he says he doesn't plan to make horse shoeing a permanent career. "I don't want to do it when I'm 40 years old," he said. He is "undecided" about his future plans, he said, but knows he wants to go into business and earn a BA or a MBA, he said.

He has made great strides toward that long range goal with an entrepreneurial spirit that does the world of business proud.

Misfortune comes to all in multiples, many sizes

People say it over and over – what a really bad time it is for this or that thing to happen. We sometimes say that bad things happen in multiples. Like storm clouds on the horizon, misfortune seems to breed misfortune.

Misfortune ranges from a visit from someone you don't have time for, to a cancer diagnosis or natural disaster. And depending on whom it happens to, the severity of it can vary.

Have you ever noticed that two splinters of the exact same size are of vastly different dimensions when they get stuck in the fingers of two different people?

One of them will shrug it off and go on. For the other, it is a life-threateningly painful event that requires much moaning and groaning.

For some folks, just living life is a misfortune. We are constantly in a state of discomfort. We can't clean up the kitchen after supper or make the bed in the morning without fussing about how the bed covers won't go into place easily or how badly the food got cooked onto the pan.

On the other hand, some people are faced with obstacles so big you'd think the intimidation factor alone would cause mental paralysis. But it doesn't. I saw a fellow in the hardware store recently who was missing both legs. He was a young man, probably in his late 20s, with a working man's shoulders, arms and hands, which made me wonder if maybe he hadn't been missing

his legs very long. But he didn't look defeated. He was poking fun at the kid with him, laughing and joking. And he was there with a purpose, looking for a specific product to do a specific job.

I've had cause to be thankful most of my life that my calamities have been small ones, the kind that you can see coming and generally work around — or, admittedly, the kind we tend to bring on ourselves.

There are people who have lost literally everything in an economic downturn they couldn't control. Some people have lost loved ones without a moment's notice in a fiery automobile crash or to swift aggressive disease. Others are living day-by-day in the grueling, uncertain recovery process of medical treatments with little or no assurance that the outcome will restore health and vitality to their loved ones or themselves.

I wonder sometimes, with all this natural inconvenience, why there is always someone out there who feels like the pot needs a good stirring — like setting off a bomb, starting a rumor, taking a gun to school or declaring a war.

For things like that, is there ever a really good time?

Knowing God’s name helps in foreign lands

The Good News

Most gods and goddesses in the ancient Middle East had names. The Bible mentions some of them: Baal, Dagon, Molech, Ashtaroth. Our God had a name, too. Yet, we didn't often call our God's name. Part of the reason for this was because, as Christians, we have a Jewish heritage; and, when we were still Jews and not yet Christians, verbalizing God's name happened only once a year, when the high priest whispered God's name in the Holy of Holies in the Jerusalem Temple. Other than that one time, God's name wasn't supposed to be mentioned. Now, Jesus mentioned God frequently in the Gospels, but like the rest of us, Jesus referred to God with titles, like "Father" (which is a title), "Abba" (which is a title, too, but like saying, "Daddy"), "Lord" (the title of a ruler), or "God" (which is actually a title and not a name).

Even if we don't say it very often these days, our God still has a name; and, we can learn what that name is in Exodus 3:13-14. Then Moses said to God, "If I come to the people of Israel and say to them, 'The God of your fathers has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM." And he said, "Say this to the people of Israel, 'I AM has sent me to you.'"

If God played first base, then God's name — I AM — would work well in the famous Abbot and Costello routine:

"I understand you're coaching this baseball team this year."

"I am."

"So who's playing first base?"

"I AM."

"You're playing first base and coaching, too?"

"No: I am coaching."

"So who's playing first base?"

"I AM."

"So you are coaching and playing first base."

"No, I am only coaching."

So why did Moses ask to know God's name? That might be something people do with each other, but is it really proper etiquette to ask a god or goddess for his or her name? Well one answer is that Moses needed to know God's name in order to make a distinction between God and all the other gods running around (or were they floating around) in the ancient Middle East. A god's name distinguished it from all the other gods, like the name, Tom, distinguishes me from all the other members of the Tooele United Methodist church staff. God's name distinguished God from all the other members of the Universal Worldly Cosmic staff — from Baal, Dagon, Molech, Ashtaroth, and so forth. Moses would, at least, be able to tell Israel which god they were following into the Promised Land.

But we're pretty clear today that we worship only one God, and we consider that our one God is the only real, living God. All the other gods aren't really gods at all: They're idols with eyes that do not see and ears that do not hear. So, given the fact that there's only one real God anyway, why would we need to know God's name these days?

As long as we stay put, living in our own neighborhoods, living in our own towns, living with our own set of neighbors knowing God's name isn't critical. Everyone knows everyone else. We're on a first name basis. We're comfortable with who we live around and with our church being just down the street, where our God and we belong.

But, a time might come when all that changes. A time might come when we're foreigners, aliens, even outsiders or strangers. Why?

There might come a day when this truly living God decides it's time to address oppression and affliction in our world, like the oppression and affliction God's people suffered in Egypt, time to address centuries of cries to God for help.

God may make a decision that it's time to act, time to do something, time to take steps and execute justice.

And at that time, God might ask those who did not oppress anyone, those who did not afflict anyone, those who did not cause someone to cry to God for help — in other words, God might ask really good, kind, loving, and faithful people to go on a little journey out of town, a short trip (like an exodus for 40 years in a wilderness), to go set up house-keeping in a different, foreign and strange land.

Then, God can stay behind (in Egypt) to deal with the oppressors, "the afflictors," and "the help deniers," where God might give oppressors a little oppression and affliction of their own and throw in a few plagues, famines and droughts for good measure.

And so, if God chooses for this time to occur in our lifetimes, it's a darn good idea to know God's name — to be able to really cry out God's name, when we're in a land where we don't know anyone. For when we're in a place that is probably a bit hostile toward us as we trespass on their lawns, when we're hungry and thirsty and don't know where to get what we need when we need it, it's probably a real good idea to know how to get in touch with the right God.

When God is gone part of the time, going back to "the old country" to take care of business, while we're out in the wilder-

ness and in need, we sure would like to know God's name then. Wouldn't he, so we can talk to God up close and personal about our needs?

So, I would say it would behoove all of us to know God's name. One never knows when it might come in handy. And so for when that day comes, let me say that God's name can be translated a number of different ways: "I AM" or "I AM WHO I AM" or "I AM WHAT I AM" or "I WILL BE WHAT I WILL BE."

But for short, we can all just call God "Yahweh." That's God's name in Hebrew: Yahweh. And when we feel like we're in a wilderness, and we need a helping hand, all we will need to do is just call God's name to ask for help, saying "Yahweh, help me."

May Yahweh be with you on all your trips out of town,

Postponing your retirement may have some impact on your Social Security benefits. The formula for calculating these benefits is complex, but adding another year of income may increase the size of your overall

benefit.

However, you may not want to — or be able to — wait any longer to retire and decide that now is the time. Many investment vehicles make it difficult for you to access your funds without tax penalties before age 59 1/2. But if you are considering retiring before age 59 1/2, you may want to dip into some income from your IRA.

If you decide to take some money out of your IRA, you'll want to try to avoid the 10 percent early withdrawal penalty that the IRS may impose on the amount you withdraw. One way to do so is by taking what's known as 72(t) distributions, which are essentially a series of substantially equal periodic payments. This strategy requires you to take — at least annually — substantially equal withdrawals that you compute based on IRS life expectancy tables and methodologies. You must continue these withdrawals for five years or until you reach age 59 1/2, whichever is longer.

For example, if at age 50 you begin taking these periodic withdrawals, you must continue

them until age 59 1/2. If you start the withdrawals at age 58, you would have to continue them for at least five years from the first payment date or until age 63.

If you use this strategy, you might consider splitting your IRA in two — one for withdrawals and the other to continue to potentially grow and act as a fallback in case of emergency.

A solid plan and a good understanding of your goals will not only help you prepare for your future, but also give you an idea of where you stand financially. You should work closely with your financial consultant to plan for retirement as well as to determine when the best time may be for you to step into your golden years.

Getting started in vending machines requires research

The ads make it sound so easy: For a set price, a vending company will set you up with its special candy machines, name-brand products to put in them and your own protected territory. All you have to do is send them the \$5,000 or more to get started, and presto — you're in business.

While there are undoubtedly some people for whom the above scenario is true, for the vast majority the result is less than satisfactory. There have been innumerable lawsuits against vending companies for fraudulent claims about promised profits, inability to find locations, low-quality machines and phony referenc-

es. Victims with losses of tens of thousands of dollars aren't unusual.

I have a friend who made \$75,000 last year in vending. But he didn't start by signing up with a vending company. He built the business himself from the ground floor.

If you want to experiment with the vending business, learn all you can before spending significant money.

Look on the back of vending machines in your area for the name and telephone number of the owner. Call and ask about the ease of maintaining the machine, the percentage of profit, and any difficulty in finding locations. Some vending machine operators will be quite forthcoming with infor-

mation — and possible warnings.

Scout locations. You want a high-traffic area, ideally one where people stay in one place for a period of time, such as a bowling alley, airport or workplace break room.

When you find a suitable location, get permission in writing from those in charge to place the machine.

Start small. Go to one of the warehouse supermarkets and pick up a three-head candy machine, as well as bags of candy and gumballs.

Your locations will tell you when it's time to expand. If you have a profitable candy machine at a business, and they ask if you can also provide a drink or snack machine,

you could be on your way to expanding your business. At the same time, if a location doesn't make a profit, move the machine.

In summary: It is possible to make a profit in vending machines, but don't go into debt to get started. Build the business yourself, one machine at a time.

Knockout and others. You need a strong dose to control perennials like white top, quack grass and bindweed, so spend the extra money to get the strongest formulation. Ready mix products are usually .5 percent — not strong enough to do the job.

Put glyphosate directly on the foliage of plants you want to eliminate, and it will be transported to the roots. This product will kill or damage nearly any plant it gets on, so avoid getting it on nearby plants. It is most effective on healthy, rapidly growing plants. Soil neutralizes this product, so do not waste your time and money by spraying the ground. It is less volatile than other

products such as 2,4-D, which carries to nearby plants and is carried through soil to roots of plants.

Since soil neutralizes glyphosate, it does not have a residual effect — you can plant new plants soon after treating undesirable plants with it.

Spray with a coarse spray so fine particles don't blow around on other plants.

Tie up spreading plants like junipers to get at weeds beneath them.

Treat a narrow band of grass at the edge of flowerbeds to keep it from invading.

Use a cardboard shield to protect plants from the spray.

Put plastic bags or milk jugs over plants you do not wish to treat in plantings. Leave them there just until the spray dries on the weeds.

To deal with large invasions

among good plants, put on a rubber glove, then a clean cotton glove over that. Put glyphosate solution on the cotton glove and handle the weeds to cover their weeds.

A spreader-sticker, available at garden centers will increase the effectiveness of glyphosate.

Keep your wood floors looking good

Q: We recently moved into a home that has a beautiful new wood floor in the living room/kitchen area. Do you have any advice on keeping it that way? — John T., Woburn, Mass.

A: The first thing to do is to find out how the floors are finished. Most new hardwood floors are treated with a surface finish (like polyurethane) rather than a wax finish. This is pretty easy to find out. Just smudge the surface (in a hidden area) with your finger. If you can't see the smudge, it's a surface finish. If you can see it plainly, that's a wax finish.

It's important to know the difference, because how you clean and maintain the floor plays a big role in how great it will look 20 years from now (or even a week from now, depending on what minor disasters strike).

Surface-finish wood floors should never be waxed, for any reason. If the finish looks dull, buff the floor with a clean

cloth to restore its luster; if this doesn't work, the floor should be recoated with the same type of finish.

Wax-finish floors need a bit more care, and high-traffic areas may need a thin coat of wax applied twice a year or more. The finish in lower-traffic areas can be buffed with a soft cloth a few times before recoating is necessary. Use a wax made specifically for wood floors, and use only a thin coat. A thick coat of wax just speeds up the "buildup" process, and the floor will have to be professionally refinished that much sooner.

Remember, never wet-mop a hardwood floor. Puddled water can wreak havoc on the wood. I recently helped with a renovation in a city apartment whose floorboards, after withstanding a hundred years of machinery and foot traffic, were now swelling and popping up due to a flood caused by a broken water pipe.

Clean hardwood floors regularly using a dust mop or a vacuum. For stuck-on dirt, a

solution of 1/4 cup vinegar in a quart of water can be spritzed onto the floor and immediately wiped up with a soft cloth. The floor's manufacturer will also recommend a commercial cleaning solution to deal with dirtier floors.

Finally, protect the floor's finish even more by placing doormats or throw rugs at the room's entrances and in heavy-traffic areas, and by placing gliders or floor protectors under the legs of furniture.

HOME TIP: Sweep or vacuum finished hardwood floors daily, if possible. The longer dirt and grit sit on a floor, the higher the chance that it will be ground against the finish by people walking through, resulting in a dull, scratched floor.

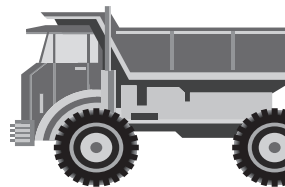

Tuscan Bread Salad

Preparation time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 6 minutes
4 tablespoons extra virgin olive oil, divided
2 cloves garlic, minced, divided
4 slices (1/2-inch-thick) Italian bread, about 4 inches in diameter
1 small head romaine lettuce

1/2 cup drained Lindsay Black Ripe Pitted Olives, halved if desired
1 large ripe tomato, seeded and diced
1 cup canned great Northern or cannellini beans, drained and rinsed
2 tablespoons balsamic vinegar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
2 tablespoons sliced fresh basil leaves (optional)

Combine 1 tablespoon olive oil and 1 clove garlic; brush over both sides of bread slices. Grill bread 2 to 3 minutes per side in ridged grill pan or broil 1 to 2 minutes per side until lightly toasted. Reserve outer leaves of lettuce. Tear or chop enough inner leaves to measure 6 cups. In large bowl, combine torn lettuce, olives, tomato and beans. Cut grilled bread into cubes; add to lettuce mixture. Combine remaining 3 tablespoons oil, remaining garlic, vinegar, salt and pepper; mix well. Add to lettuce mixture; toss well. Arrange outer leaves of lettuce on 4 serving plates; top with salad. Sprinkle basil over salads, if desired. Makes 4 servings

Variation: Sliced grilled chicken may be served over the salad.

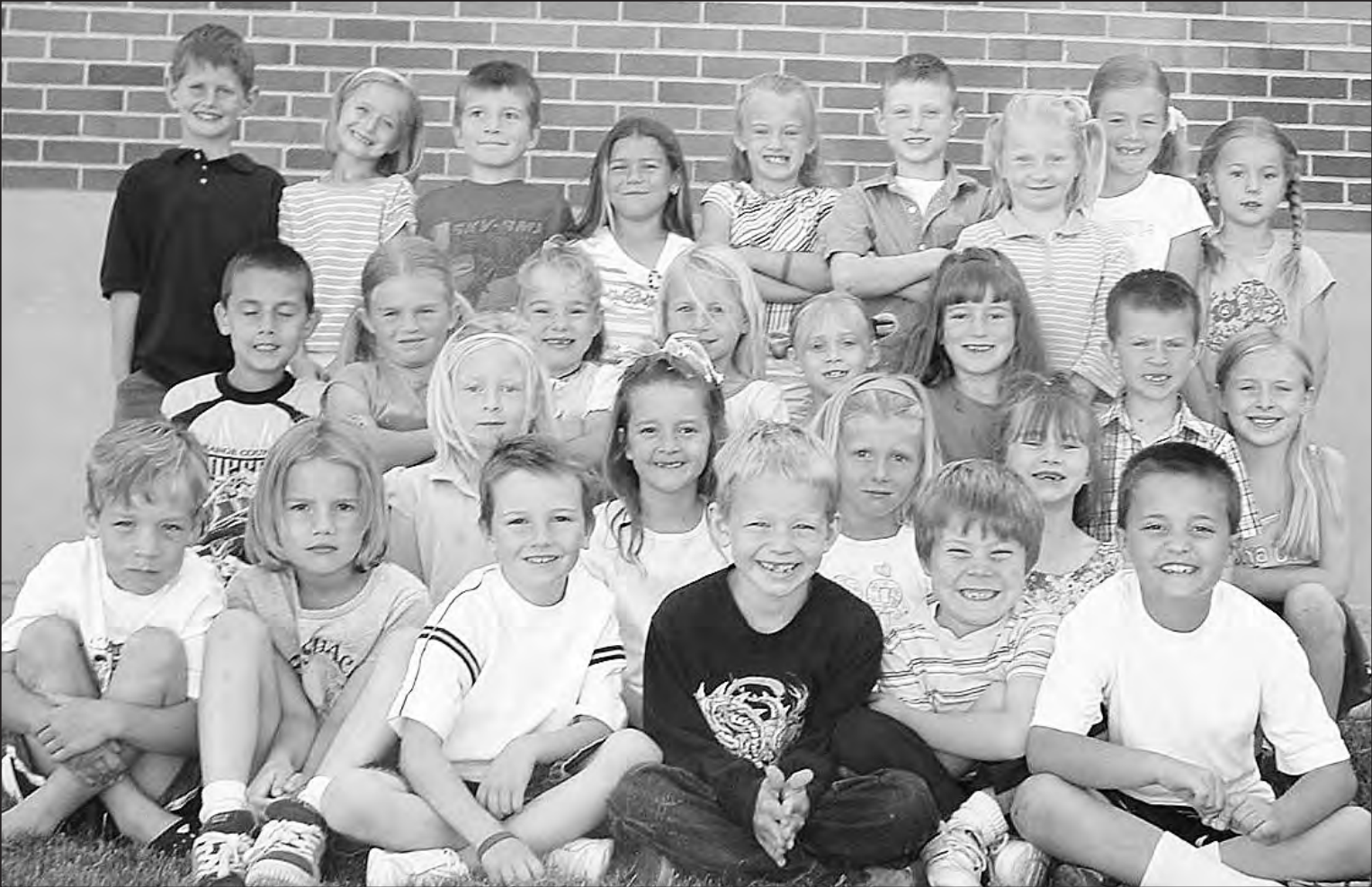

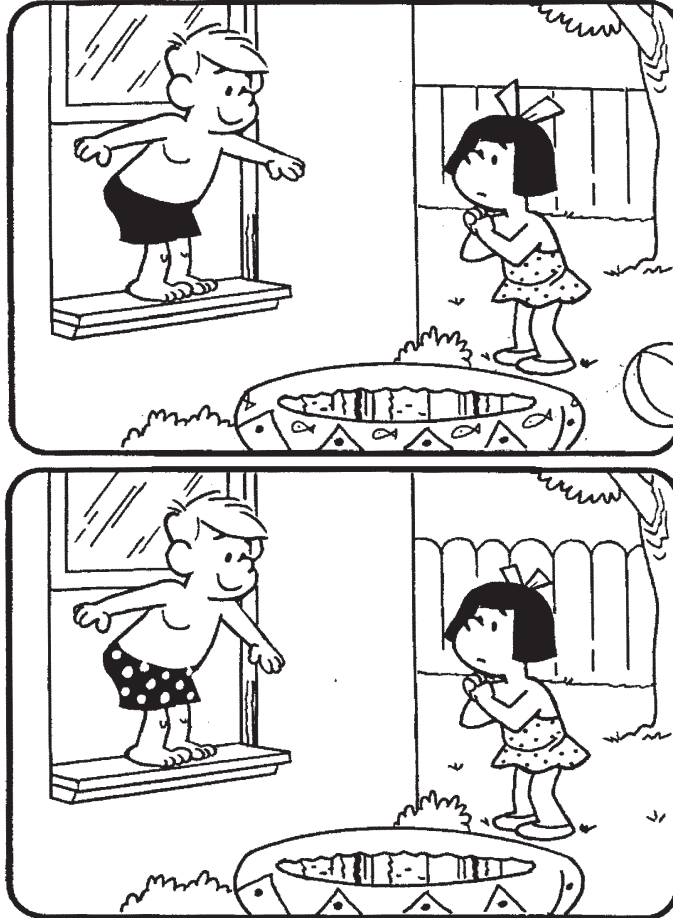

Grow a salsa garden this summer

Chop and stir up a mouth-watering batch of nutritious salsa with fresh-picked ingredients from your own garden! Serve the zesty treat as a topping on grilled meat and tacos, as a side dish with Mexican rice and beans, or just plain scoop it up with your favorite chips at a summer picnic.

If you get your kids involved from the start, they'll be excited to get digging and tending this themed family-gardening project. Your plot doesn't have to be large, either. In fact, you can grow the ingredients in a container garden on your porch or deck. Just don't crowd too many plants together, as they will spread out as they grow. Whatever you choose, be sure the plants receive at least six hours of full sunlight daily.

The first step is off to the garden center to choose the plants you'll need to spice up your landscape. Look for:

- 1 tomato plant
- 2 bell-pepper plants
- 1 habanero- or jalapeño-pepper plant if you want a hot salsa
- Several onion plants
- Cilantro plant (This traditional ingredient in Mexican cooking,

also known as coriander, adds a distinctive flavor to your salsa. If your children don't care for the taste, grow standard parsley, which may be substituted in the recipe below. Both are hearty plants and will grow abundantly all summer long. Plus, they release enticing scents your kids can learn to identify.)

Marigold plants (optional). Let the kids plant them along the border for their bright, sunny color and for organic pest control!



Here's a good, basic salsa recipe your school-age kids can prepare with you as you harvest your crop. It is the traditional Salsa Fresca, otherwise known as Pico de Gallo.

Pick and prepare:

- 2 ripe tomatoes
- 1 medium onion
- 1 bell pepper
- 1 hot pepper, sliced in half,

seeded and minced (an adult or older child should cut the hot pepper while wearing kitchen gloves)

1/4 cup finely chopped cilantro or parsley

Juice from a lemon or lime

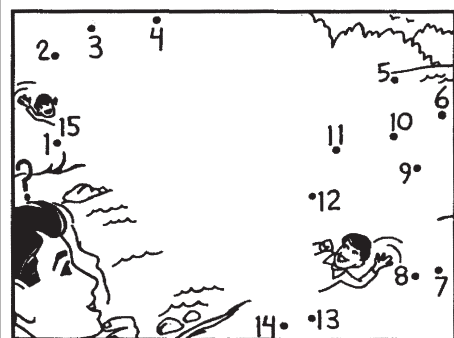
Dice/chop the first 3 ingredients the same size and place in a mixing bowl. Add minced hot

pepper to taste, cilantro and juice. Stir and allow to rest 30 minutes. Add salt and pepper to taste. The heat of fresh salsa often increases after an hour or two.

For a variation on your next batch, add chopped fresh garlic.

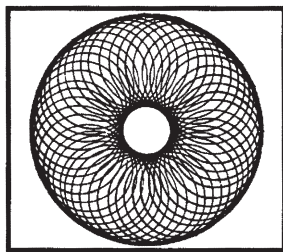

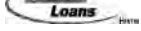

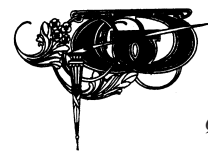

Frozen foods that have partially thawed and still have ice crystals may be safely refrozen. Most once-frozen foods that have been thawed

Be sure to wash and sanitize undamaged containers before opening. To disinfect the cans, remove paper labels and wash the contain-

Immerse the clean, rinsed cans in a lukewarm (75 to 120 F) solution of chlorine for two minutes. Use 2 tablespoons of 5 percent chlorine bleach per gallon of water. Chlorine loses its effectiveness when it is in a solution and open to the air or when it comes in contact with unclean materials, so it is important

Wash all dishes and utensils in hot soapy water with a brush to remove dirt. Sanitize glass, ceramic and china dishes, glass baby bottles and empty canning jars using the same method for undamaged cans. Dishes with deep cracks should be thrown away. Metal pans and utensils can be disinfected by immersing them in water and boiling for

Food poisoning can be serious and even deadly. If you have concerns about the safety of food that has been exposed to floodwater, proper handling of the food is very important. If you are not able to take the time to clean and disinfect canned items, utensils and dishes, it is best to throw them away.
